Interim Moderator

We are very pleased to announce that the Scottish Synod has appointed the Revd Nick Mark as Interim Moderator to Annan URC. He writes: -

Dear Friends,

The Synod of Scotland realise that it is always a hard time for a Church when their minister leaves and tries to do something to cover the period that follows until a permanent appointment can be made with some kind of limited ministerial assistance known as an Interim Moderator. To that end the Moderator has appointed me to that role. I am a retired URC Minister living with my wife Janet in Lockerbie and am still involved in URC matters as a National Trustee and as a small part of the team that oversee discipline of Ministers. I preach regularly in a number of churches. My last post before retirement in early 2020 was being a member of the Cumbria URC team of ministers covering North Cumbria from a base in Carlisle. My background before my Ordination in 2002 was as a Solicitor working in the Probate field and since Ordination I have served in various parts of England and developed a great interest in Ecumenical matters which was why I spent almost the last 8 years of my ministry in Cumbria where the Anglican, Methodist, Church of Scotland, Salvation Army and URC churches worked very closely together. I have also been a volunteer Police Chaplain, Sea Cadet Chaplain and Boys Brigade Chaplain. Elders have agreed that I should conduct one service a month so that I can get to know as many of you as possible and also attend important meetings. My role is really to support the initiatives that Alan Poolton and the Elders were in the process of carrying forward before his retirement and to give guidance where required.

Thought for the month

John Stott said 'The authority by which the Christian leader leads is not by power but love, not force but example, not coercion but reasoned persuasion. Leaders have power, but power is safe only the hands of those who humble themselves to serve.

What does God Require of us?

On one occasion in the past it was felt that our church might close, and the meeting to discuss closure drew so many people that every seat was taken and folk were left standing. Is this a scenario to be repeated to persuade folk who have stopped attending during Covid to come more regularly?

The world and the church is changing and reforming. Our Church family are at a stage where vital decisions have to be made – about ourselves and our attitudes as well as organisation and governance. We hold on to the familiar with a monthly event to try to attract people from our local community, but we are on a journey and there is no turning back. We need a different approach to bring new disciples into the church family, and we need you to help with the mission God expects of us.

The role of the local church is more important than ever. It is not enough to look for people to come in and join – relationships need to start, to be fostered – where folk are accepted, and we are renewed in our commitment to serve. A commitment with no 'ifs' and 'buts' enables a chance to build something positive.

A church family with only a dozen people worshipping together is raising concern, and there is opportunity for you to join in discussion about our life and witness as a church family at the Church Meeting on June 19th.

We are part of the Christian community in Annan, and we need everyone connected with us to come, to make their voice heard so that we build on the heritage of the past for the witness we bear in the future.

One of the partners we support in Bangladesh is ActionAid. They do outstanding work, like helping 10year-old Jesmin who lived on the streets of Dhaka.

Jesmin's family was so poor they barely had anything to eat. Now **Jesmin lives in an ActionAid funded 'Happy Home'** - where she can enjoy a proper meal, learn, and play with other girls, and gain skills for the future, safe from harm.

"When I used to live on the street, **boys used bad words** against me and they were beating me," Jesmin said. "So, my understanding is girls are not safe on the streets."

"Now I love living in Happy Homes. **I can eat healthy food regularly.** I've learned to make necklaces, bracelets, anklets, and I can do embroidery. **And I can study**. I am in class 5. My favourite subject is Social Science and English."

Thank you for your prayers, advocacy, and generosity in support of remarkable young people like Jesmin, who thrive if only given a chance.
