Dear Friends,

Our Lectionary readings in October focus on chapters 17, 18 and 19 of Luke's Gospel and they focus on faithful service, patience, persistence and making the best use of the talents God has given the members of our congregation. We begin that cycle of readings by looking on Sunday the 2nd at Luke 17 verses 5-10 where we consider the disciples request to Jesus to increase their faith. The answer they get is to jolly well get on with it and simply faithfully serve and use the powers God has given us and not demand more. On the 9th of October in looking at Luke 17 verses 11-19 we consider the simplicity of God's healing grace. On the 16th of October we look at the first 8 verses of Luke 18. Here is the parable of the widow who pesters the judge for justice. There is a very real message here for the congregation in Annan of recognising what you are fighting for and of how persistence actually does pay off. It is easy for all of us when a mission initiative seems to produce a nil result to say well, we tried but there is no point in ever having another go. The widow keeps on trying to break the seemingly impenetrable barrier and with God's help succeeds.

The 23rd of October Lectionary reading from Luke 18 verses 9-14 brings us down to earth with a bump so to speak in the parable of the Pharisee and the Tax Collector. The punch line is that Jesus points out the better Christian is the humble despised Tax Collector not the exemplary Pharisee who makes sure everybody knows who he is.

The 30th of October Lectionary reading from Luke 18 verses 1-10 is about the transformation of Zacchaeus from a dishonest tax collector to a man prepared to repay those he had swindled

So our October Sunday readings will be a chance to reflect in our congregation how much God blesses us and wills us on and encourages us when we feel down to look around us and see how we can grow in faith and continue to pursue our God given calling. It also challenges us to engage with people in the community outside who we may have shunned for previous misdeeds. This year marks the fiftieth anniversary of the URC and we can truly reflect on how patient and persistent we have been because the goal when the URC was formed in 1972 was to achieve a united Christian Church, is a long way from fruition, but times and thinking have moved on and our continuing efforts to promote ecumenism have not faltered.

The U.R.C was formed in 1972 by a union of the Presbyterian Church of England and a majority of the Congregational Church in England and Wales.

In 1981 the Reformed Association of Churches of Christ in Great Britain and Ireland united with the U.R.C and in 2000 the Congregational Church in Scotland united too. 
Over the coming weeks we will be beginning our badge work across all sections of the Company.
