INTERIM MODERATOR'S LETTER SEPTEMBER 2023

Dear Friends,

I am writing this at a time when normal service so to speak resumes in both Church life and the world outside, as young people have either returned to School or are about to start higher education in all its shapes and sizes. For those of us who finished our childhood education a long time ago, it still means change with grandparents no longer needed to provide holiday care.

Here at Annan URC we welcome David Townsend as a URC Ordinand with the Scottish College. His sending Church is Augustine United Church Edinburgh, which has as its Minister the outgoing Moderator of General Assembly. David will be with us until January at least and has, I know, already had a warm welcome from many of you. His experience will be of much benefit to us as a fellowship, whilst we hope he has the opportunity of observing how a much smaller URC functions in a very different context to that which he has had in Edinburgh.

September sees the return of our Soup and Sweet Lunches after the summer break, and these are a firm favourite among not just our congregation but among other folk in Annan, and to my amazement we even have a long distance participant from the South of Cumbria. Such fellowship is a very important aspect of church life, and it is not always easy to split the spiritual life from the social life of the Church. The two complement each other.

September sees us building on the August services in wanting to organise ourselves to become more useful as a small part of God's mission in Jesus. On 3rd September we focus on Matthew 16 verses 21-28 and consider how frightening it can be to place ourselves in the hands of Jesus, but realise how much can be achieved by so doing. 10th September brings us on to Matthew 18 verses 15-20 to really consider the importance of community and holding it together. On 17th September, in looking at Matthew 18 verses 21-35 we look at another aspect of community, and that is the concept of forgiveness and the role of God in this. Finally on 24th September in Matthew 20 verses 1-16 we study the huge problem of fairness, or rather lack of it in our world, and our role in campaigning for a fairer world.

This month also sees a significant event in Church life, by holding a special service followed by a barbecue on 24th September. It will demonstrate the many roles Church plays in the community in seeking a fairer world. We have decided to join many other churches of a variety of denominations in celebrating **Back To Church Sunday**. The title is something of a misnomer, in the sense that the purpose of the day is to welcome new people who may never have been to church, as well as those who are lapsed church attenders, to see what church is like in the 21st century. I come across all the time in my daily life people who have preconceived ideas of what church people are like and what Church worship is about. So often those preconceptions are at tremendous variance from reality. Back to Church Sunday will be an opportunity for us to welcome new people and to showcase what we can offer. It isn't only about Sunday, it is about the fellowship we offer during the week and the opportunity for young people to participate in Girls Brigade, Guides and Brownies and not forgetting the musical training our organist Barbara offers.

The idea is that Church members invite people they know to join this happy day of celebration. Please don't worry if the Scottish weather makes it a rather dreich day, because we will, with a building our size, have suitable plans to be adaptable so we can give our visitors a true welcome! I would also mention there is no intention of holding a communion service that day as we want to keep things simple. There will be in the days to come more details from our organising Committee.

Ministry And Mission Fund - Annual Letter To Local Churches

To: All members and adherents of United Reformed Churches and our Local Ecumenical Partnerships

Dear Friends,

When will normal service be resumed?

As we are writing this letter and closing off the URC's accounts for 2022, the country is still torn with industrial disputes, mostly notably with Health Service workers, rail industry workers, teachers etc. etc. Whatever your view as to the wisdom or justice of such action, we suspect all of us are affected by the disruption to some degree.


In church life too, are we back to "normal life"? Some churches no doubt have returned to something like their pre-Covid level of activity and attendance numbers. Quite a few have recommenced their activity but find their numbers have reduced. Some churches have found reopening too difficult and have decided to close.

Whatever the "new normal" was to be, we suggest its arrival has (like many trains) been disrupted, delayed, or cancelled all together.

The URC's finance officers had concerns that the late arrival of the return to normality would impact very significantly on the giving to the M&M Fund in 2022. However, the churches responded magnificently and the giving to M&M was £600,000 ahead of budget. It was also only 2.5% down on 2021's result.



So, thank you to all who continued to contribute to your local church, thank you to all those churches who met their commitment for 2022 in full, and thank you to all those who, in adversity, continued to treat the M&M Fund as the first priority and paid what they could. With normal service not yet resumed, 2023 is not going to be an easy year either. We now have the added disruption of high inflation, pushing up wages and overhead costs. As the Spirit directs and as our means allow, can the churches once more respond to the call of our gracious, loving and ever-generous God?

Again, thank you all!

During the summer holidays, one of the memorable places I visited was the magnificent Alnwick Castle in Northumberland.

The Castle is home to the 12th Duke of Northumberland and his family. Founded in the late 11th century, it has been the seat of the Percy family for centuries, and is the second largest inhabited Castle in England. This year, to mark the Coronation of King Charles 3rd, the Castle staged a "Crowns and Coronets" exhibition. It was absolutely fascinating as I love Royal Family history. In 1953 the present Duke's mother was Mistress of the Robes at the Coronation of Queen Elizabeth 2nd.
