

#### **Minister's letter**

Dear Friends,

As I write this, the newspapers and news bulletins are dominated by political events, election results, leadership bids and the ongoing Brexit conversations. There is today an understandable cynicism about politics and about politicians. That is at least as widespread inside the church as it is outside. Many of us tend to regard politics as a dubious business, full of scheming, unreliable and extremely ambitious people. No doubt there are some untrustworthy people involved in politics but there are also many men and women of integrity.

The political life of this country will be shaped by the people who are involved in it. It is vital that the Christian voice is heard in the corridors of power and the Christian opinion is expressed when important decisions are being taken, both at local and at national level. Those Christian people who offer themselves for public service in the political sphere have an important role to play.

The Christian faith has been progressively marginalised over recent years. The Christian viewpoint is often ignored and Christians often feel excluded from the decision-making process. If that is the case, then we ourselves must take our share of the responsibility. Political involvement has always been part of the Methodist tradition, particularly in the industrial and mining areas of the country.

The political life of our community and our country needs the involvement of Christian people committed to expressing their faith in that sphere. If the Christian voice isn't being heard, then we have only ourselves to blame.

## **Carboy Appeal: June**

**Aquabox** is a charity and community project set up and managed by the Rotary Club of Wirksworth to provide safe drinking water, through the use of filtration units, and humanitarian aid to crisis zones around the world.

Since its formation in 1992, Aquabox has distributed more than 110,000 boxes to countries suffering from natural and man-made disasters, helping hundreds of thousands of people in more than 50 countries. As well as a water-filtration unit, each Aquabox contains a variety of humanitarian aid items, including cooking utensils, hygiene equipment, tools, shelter materials, baby and children's clothing and educational items.

Even today, more than one billion people in the world are without access to safe water. About half of the world's poor suffer from waterborne diseases, over 6,000 people – mainly children – die each day by consuming unsafe drinking water.

Safe water interventions have a vast potential to transform the lives of millions, more especially those in areas of the world suffering disasters both natural and man-made.

*The Aquafilter Family.* Fits into an Aid Box. The box is filled with water, and the filter clipped onto the side. The user then just has to pump to get drinking water at the rate of 1 litre a minute.

*The Aquafilter Community.* Was developed for schools and other organisations delivering up to 300 litres of drinking water an hour.

### **Uniformed Organisations at the Grove**

For those of you at the Parade service in May you may remember my plea for leaders to help in both our Scout and Guide units. As you are aware all leaders are volunteers who give of their own free time to help support young people from 5 to 18 in having fun, adventure, making lifelong friends and learning some key skills to support them in later life.

Last year in the Scout Section whilst we had a large increase of 10% in young people there was a large turnover of leaders leaving to a reduction by 20%. This was most keenly felt in our Scout Troops where at one point we had to consider closing one of the 2 troops. Luckily a number of parents and others not previously connected to the Group stepped forward and now thanks to their commitment we are back on a more even setting.

This year we are experiencing difficulties in our younger sections with both Beavers and Cubs looking for leaders, Whilst not in as potentially perilous state as the Scouts last year I would not want to reach that position and am therefore looking to recruit new leaders or assistants across all sections to ensure the young people have the best support possible. If you yourself are interested or know someone (relative, friend, neighbour or work colleague) who may be interested please ask them to get in touch, I am always willing to have a chat, explain a little about Scouting at the Grove and help them decide if this is a challenge for them without any pressure from me at all.

For those of you who feel the weekly meetings may be a little too much either in your time commitment or any other way we are also looking to recruit a new Secretary and Treasurer to our Scout Executive. Both roles have a commitment to attend 4 or 5 meetings over the year, the Secretary taking and distributing the minutes of the meetings, whilst the Treasurer takes care of the finances of the Group. You get a cup of tea and a biscuit at the meeting and an understanding of the Group's plans for the future and a hand in making some of the important decisions for the Group. Our Secretary steps down in July this year so we are desperate to fill this as quickly as possible, whilst the treasurer will stay for another 6 months or so to help a new volunteer get to grips with the accounts etc. Both roles are vital to the running of the Group so if you feel you are able too offer your help please get in touch to have a chat.

In this note I have highlighted the difficulties we are facing in the Scout Group but I am also aware of a similar lack of leaders being faced by our sisters in Guiding if anyone feels that this is something for you please get in touch and I will make sure your details are passed onto the Guiding Section.



## FOODBANK NEWS

Many thanks to all who support the Foodbank by leaving food and toiletries in the trolley in the church porch. All donations of food are much appreciated especially since the number of people using the foodbank has increased dramatically. This has been found to be true nationally as the following report shows:





Also locally 11,710 people were given 3 days food supplies at Leeds North and West Foodbank Centres last year.

This is a 22.5% increase on the number of people helped the year before.

## **Cross Hall Morley**

Paul and I last September drove across Europe to visit the Porsche Factory and Museum in Stuttgart followed by touring in Austria based around Salzburg with 19 other crews made up of 13 couples and 7 all male crews, the majority from the UK but also from Ireland and America.

We have since maintained contact with several and had a reunion in the Cotswolds a few weeks ago. This introduction gives a little background to how we met up with a lady who is doing her family history.

Her Great Grandfather lived in the late 1800s at Cross Hall, Morley which was the home of John Wesley and also in the late 1700s of Mary Bosanquet-Fletcher.

Mary Bosanquet-Fletcher was a Methodist preacher. She is credited with persuading John Wesley, one of the founders of Methodism, to allow women to publicly preach. She, along with her friend and fellow preacher Sarah Crosby, would become the most popular female preachers of their time.

Today the brick building has since been converted into flats for the over 55's and is managed by the Places for People Housing Association.

We would like to expand this story and will do some research, if any reader can add anything please get in touch.
