Crocus Flower – Symbolism

Crocus flower symbolism was particularly strong in Greece and Egypt. Greeks used it as a symbol of eternal love, which is a symbolic meaning derived from the story about Crocus and Smilax. Crocus was a young boy who fell in love with Smilax, who was a beautiful shepherdess.

After gods forbid him to get married to her, he killed himself. Smilax was inconsolable and to ease her pain, goddess Flora turned both her and Crocus into flowers. She was turned into a vine and since then Crocus flowers and vines were used as wedding decorations as symbols of love.

In Egypt Crocus flowers were used to prevent fumes from alcoholic drinks by spraying these flowers over the glasses.

Ancient Romans loved the fragrance of Crocus flower that they used it as a scent for their homes and for themselves.

- 3. Reports District Cllr E Rylance briefly outlined the process of the emerging Local Plan. No decision on sites for housing had been made yet and would be out to consultation in due course. She advised that once the new Local Plan is finalized the Farringdon Neighbourhood Plan may need to be revised alongside this. There are to be few modifications for Cranbrook.

Cty Cllr S Randall-Johnson outlined some of the big budgetary items for DCC in the coming financial year. Social Care 10.5% Childrens Care 10.8% Highways 0.4% Council Tax is to rise by 1.9%

Exeter Airport Report- This report outlines plans to create a much larger control zone which will encompass all flight activity under the radio/radar control of Exeter ATC. A large "buffer" will be created around the airport making for a much safer traffic flow (The PC thanked Jerry Bird for his imput in explaining this lengthy report)

9. Parish Council Matters

- a. Parishioner Concerns-
- -Parishioners contacted the PC regarding concerns of unacceptably high levels of methane being recorded at HB business Park. Methane is a hazard to health. The PC understands that Barnaby Grubb from DCC is addressing the concern.
- -The height of the mounds at HB continue to be an ongoing concern for residents living close to the business park. These are exceeding their permitted heights. Barnaby Grubb (DCC)has been contacted and is keeping residents informed
- -The flooding on the A3052 continues to be a problem despite all the work carried out by SWW last year. This is largely due to inadequate drainage
- Compost odour from Coastal Organics continues to be a concern to residents
- 21/2914/FUL The temporary lorry traffic park continues to cause concern to nearby residents. Residents complain that they have suffered a severe loss of amenity re noise, visual impact. This site was refused permanent permission. This is in total contravention of the Local Plan and the Farringdon Neighbourhood Plan.
- **b.** Update re Air Pollution Services- Residents are submitting information to Dr Austin Coogan (APS). Cllr J Chanot has been liaising directly with him on behalf of the PC.

WHAT TO DO IN THE EVENT OF A FLOOD

In the event of a flood, there are many authorities available to help. Below outlines who should be contacted for the various types of flooding incidents and emergencies that occur. The local authorities rely on information reported to them to inform any investigations and prioritisation of investment. If it is an emergency and there is danger to life as a result of flooding, you should not hesitate to call 999

To report flooding of the highway and blocked drains contact Devon County Council's Highway Customer Service Centre on 0345 155 1004 or visit the Roads and Transport webpage. Office hours are Monday to Friday 8am – 8pm and Saturdays 9am – 1pm. For emergencies outside of these hours call 01392 383329

For any flooding on major trunk roads (the M5, A30, A38, A35 and A303) contact the Highways Agency on 0300 123 5000 (24 hour service)

To report flooding from sewers and water pipes contact South West Water on 0344 346 2020 (24 hour service)

For enquiries about flood warnings contact the Environment Agency's Floodline on 0345 988 1188 (24 hour service)

For general enquiries about Main River or flooding from the sea contact the Environment Agency on 03708 506 506

For all other flooding enquiries contact the Devon County Council Flood Risk Management Team on 0345 155 1015 or email floodrisk@devon.gov.uk

A Message from the Vicarage



This is the story given by an assistant curate of the first time she went to church – for a small congregation. If the words are hers; I will use *italics*.

My apologies for my non-churchgoing readers, but I am sure you can draw parallels in more secular life.

When the curate was fourteen, she turned up at a church unaccompanied, was given a pile of books and papers and told to sit wherever she liked. So, she says,

'I slipped in at the back ... and was totally baffled'. The vicar did try to help giving page numbers, but they were wrong! (I know that feeling). She continues:

"... by the end, I had decided that this church thing wasn't for me. It didn't make sense. I hadn't got anything out of it and wouldn't be going back. That might have been the end of the story, if it weren't for Patricia'.

This lady, in her eighties, wasn't an evangelist, but simply said:

"Hello, dear, you're new aren't you? I'm sorry I didn't see you come in, or I would have asked you to sit with me. Would you like to sit with me next week?" The teenager, brought up not to disappoint old ladies, agreed and went back the next week to sit with her. And ... she kept going to church, amazingly.

All Patricia did was to point out what page we were on and telling her when to stand or sit. 'That's it. That's all she did. No proclamation of the faith, no moment of "conversion". But as a result, Patricia helped the young woman encounter God.

'Quietly, unspectacularly, on an ordinary Sunday, this very unassuming woman changed my life ... by her gentle witness to the steadfastness of God'.

In her article the curate points out that Jesus regularly calls our attention to the small and the ordinary, and people like Patricia. There are many "Patricias" in our church communities and in our villages. But are you one of them; would you have behaved in a similar neighbourly way in a similar situation? The problem of course is that our "British stand-offishness" doesn't help, nevertheless, I hope and pray that you would do the same as Patricia, whatever your belief, whatever your 'churchpersonship' (forgive the use of this word).

The female curate finishes, as do I, with this paragraph:

'Anyway, all this is to say: don't underestimate the Patricias in your congregations ... Pray for them, and thank God for their quiet, hidden ministry and faithfulness – even if neither you nor they will ever see the fruit of it.'

A GREETING FROM THE NEW RECTOR.

My DEAR PEOPLE OF FARRINGDON,-

I had hoped to have been able by this time to call you "My dear Parishioners," but this may not be quite yet. I am very glad of this opportunity of sending you a few words of kindly greeting and telling you how much Mrs. Housman and myself are looking forward to making the acquaintance of you all. We know that we cannot hope for a long time, if ever, to be able to fill the place of those who are so soon to leave you and whom you have known so long, but at the same time, you will believe. I trust, that our one great wish in coming among you will be, that we may be able to be of some help to you, not only in spiritual things, but also in the smaller matters of every-day life, and that you will allow us, as far as possible, to be sharers in your joys and sorrows. Let us try always to bear in mind the great object which both clergyman and people ought always to have before them and strive after with all their might, that is, to be always "pressing toward the mark for the prize of the high calling," and to "help the Faith which was once delivered to the Saints."

This handsome and most unexpected gift will form a permanent memorial of the many years of happy relationship both with teachers and scholars.

On Saturday, October 7, in the afternoon at the Schoolroom, Miss Tuckey's and Miss Guest's Working Party, on behalf of Dr. Barnardo's Homes, held a Sale of Work. Mrs. Loram, Mayoress of Exeter, kindly performed the opening ceremony. Short concerts were held at intervals during the afternoon, performed

by the School children and friends. The Sale realized about £10.

On Thursday, October 21, the Schoolroom was again the scene of a memorable occasion. The Rector and Mrs. and Miss Gill were the recipients of very valuable and substantial presents. Mr. Whitworth and Mr. Holmes, in most kindly and affectionate terms, made the presentation, and I only wish I had room to give a full account of the proceedings; but I must leave the newspaper to supply my shortcomings, and simply say once again, Thank you, and God bless you now and evermore for your goodness to me and mine.
