A MESSAGE FROM DAVID

April is such a glorious month in the church's year and yet as it begins we are still in Lent. This month encompasses the highs and the lows in the Christian story, all within a few weeks.

As we set out on this journey, it reminds me of the longer journey we've been on this past two years. If we think back just a year, how very different things felt even then.

And of course we're frustrated and impatient for things to change more, for life to become simpler once again. It's worth remembering how far we've come already.

Our Christian hope tells us that however bad things get, there is always the possibility of unexpected good coming out of it. In the coming weeks we will live through both the death and the resurrection of Jesus. Our faith doesn't deny that things go wrong, that bad things happen. We know that from our lives as well as our TV screens. What our faith tells us is that at any moment we can be surprised by the creativity, the resilience, the stubbornness, of goodness, which shows up in the most surprising places and in the most unexpected of ways. This is God at work in the world.

Our biggest privilege as Christians is to be God's partners in this adventure: to be the ones who seek out the places where God is at work, point at them and name them. We get to be the people who use human words to bring God's presence to people's attention, rather as Mary Magdalene did all those years ago on the first Easter Day.

This is the drama that should be at the centre of church life. Far too often we get caught up in church with other, rather less important dramas. And we miss the epic tale which God invites us to get caught up in.

Where is God at work in William Street? In your street? Where is Easter waiting to happen in your life, in your neighbourhood?

This is the day that the Lord has made: let us rejoice and be glad in it.

Enlightenment and Settlement

Welcome back readers. I'm finding I have to take shorter hops forward for each report because there's so much change and, despite the feelings of some that religion and affairs of state should remain totally separate, the opposite continues to be reality. We've made it into the 18th century, 1728 to be precise, but difference of opinion and ideology remain the basis for conflict within the church and it shouldn't be forgotten that power in the church also means power in the state. We'll start with a round-up from around the world but, as is becoming common, change within the state in Britain is having a significant impact on the church.

America is still coming to terms with the challenges of its development. We've already seen many different religious groups being founded with a wide range of beliefs, some in line with Christian understanding, whereas others take the questions of the Reformation much further. A further new sect was established by Jacob Amman in 1693. Known as the Amish, they're a traditionalist and Puritan group with European Anabaptist origins, and particularly Mennonite in their teachings. They're already renowned for maintaining a simple way of life exclusive of various conveniences that are becoming commonplace elsewhere.

Just as there's been witch-hunts in Europe, this process has migrated to colonial America. In 1692/3, a series of trials in the town of Salem, Massachusetts saw more than 200 people accused of witchcraft. Over 25 people died either by execution or 'other causes' (at least 5 died strangely in jail). They're already being considered 'infamous'.

Within the Catholic Church, divisions continue. The "Old Catholic Church of the Netherlands" is a branch that originates from the Archdiocese of Utrecht. Influenced by Jansenism (a theological movement within Catholicism that has evolved in France), this group has split from the main Catholic Church and is currently in conflict over a number of doctrines: the chance of reconciliation seems remote.

Increasingly, the Christian Church, both Catholic and Reformed, is seeking to extend into new worlds and new parts of the globe not previously accessible – Missionaries! In China, the Catholic Church has collided with the established teachings of the Ancient Chinese philosopher, Confucius (who lived about 500 years before Christ). His teachings centre on a range of cultural values, giving respect to senior family figures and social harmony. Whilst Jesuits see these Chinese rites as secular, yet compatible with Christianity, other Catholic missionaries disagree. It's causing quite a stir - a "Chinese Rites Controversy" indeed - which threatens to impact on the spread of Christianity in China. Elsewhere, Lutheran missionaries have extended out to Tranquebar, in Southeast India, and to Greenland.

Some 200 years on from nailing of theses to a church door in Wittenberg, Lutherans continue to debate theology. David Hollatz has set out various Lutheran dogmas in one publication and Valentin Ernst Loscher has presented another opposing Pietism. Such debates seem set to continue. Finally, Peter the Great, Tsar of Russia, has replaced the traditional Patriarchate of the Russian Orthodox Church with an elected Holy Synod.

Religious aspects in Britain are far from simple and straightforward. Having flip-flopped between Catholicism and the Protestant approach, Britain seems to have now settled on Protestantism with the Glorious Revolution of 1688 which granted William of Orange, and his wife Mary, the English throne. Then, at the end of my last report, the "Bill of Rights" of 1689 was enacted. At that time, England and Wales were considered as one Kingdom, with Scotland and Ireland as separate Kingdoms - despite sharing the same monarch! All that has changed. Scotland was resistant to domination by England, but the Bill of Rights had given certain statement of rights to individuals and together with a further 'Act of Settlement' in 1701, a clear line of succession to the throne was established that excluded Roman Catholics. These 2 Acts together seem as they will be as definitive in British history as the Magna Carta of 1215.

When Mary died in 1694, William continued to reign alone until his death in 1702, but they'd had no children. So, the crown passed to Mary's younger sister, Anne, who reigned as Queen until 1714. Despite 17 pregnancies (of which only 5 resulted in live births), her longest surviving child, William, died at the age of 11, even before Anne assumed the throne. Foreseeing a difficulty, the Act of Settlement was a direct and necessary consequence to avoid a return to Catholicism — the British Parliament was clear that a Protestant line of monarchy was required. Besides Mary and Anne, who'd both been raised as Protestants, there was another child of James II, namely James Francis Edward Stuart. He'd been raised a Catholic and, but for the Act of Settlement, would have succeeded before Anne. Nicknamed the 'Old Pretender', he had particular support in Scotland as a Stuart. James II had gone into exile following the events of 1688, and when he died in 1701, his son claimed to be James III of England

and Ireland and James VIII of Scotland. He sought support from his cousin, King Louis XIV of France, but his claims were never recognised.


In 1707, an Act of Union was passed, formally uniting the thrones of England and Scotland and creating a new 'Great Britain', although Ireland remains separate. James Stuart did attempt to gain the British thrones with a Jacobite rising in 1715 but was unsuccessful. The death of childless Anne, in 1714, nearly brought a constitutional crisis, but it was possible to establish a link to George, Duke of Hanover, her Second Cousin, twice removed, as great-grandson of James I/VI. So now Britain has a new line of monarchs from the 'House of Hanover'. George I has just been succeeded, last year, by his son, George II, who, as a relatively young 44 year-old, could reign for some time. A Protestant monarchy in Britain seems secure!

When we entered the 17th Century, there seemed to be a new "Age of Reason". There was emphasis on scientific explanation and logic. Over the last 100 years this 'reason' has progressed into being regarded as 'Enlightenment'. It's difficult to say when this change happened. Along the way, Rene Descartes wrote a "Discourse on the Method" in 1637, and came up with the line "I think, therefore I am" - there's been a lot of people pondering on that one! In Britain there's been a, frankly, quite brilliant scientist called Sir Isaac Newton; his "Principia Mathematica", in 1687, is being heralded as the culmination of the scientific revolution. But the ideas of 'Enlightenment' extend beyond science and philosophy, they undermine the authority of establishment such as monarchies and the Catholic Church. Newton was not just a scientist, he was also a keen theologian; some of his works challenged religious doctrine, most particularly that of the Catholic Church. He declined the opportunity to take 'Holy Orders' within the Church of England in his early years and his theological perspectives are only just coming to light following his death last year. Contrary to much of the thought in Western Europe, Newton appears to have been a non-trinitarian. These views would, perhaps, not have reflected so well on such a respected figure during his lifetime. As Master of the Royal Mint and President of the Royal Society he was well regarded, and his scientific achievements have earned him an elaborate final resting place in Westminster Abbey.

No matter how we have progressed from 'Reason', we are now, most certainly, in an 'Age of Enlightenment'. For some within the church, the last 80 years have been challenging, especially for those dependent on the church for a living. It seems that there may have been those that have followed a changing political wind: an amusing song has emerged. Entitled the Vicar of Bray, I'm not sure if it satires a particular person or attitudes and alterations of many, either way, I have sent along a score with this report for your amusement.

The Vicar of Bray

If you have been following the Christian Chronicles recently, you may find this satirical ditty from the early 18th Century amusing:



In good King Charles's golden days, When Loyalty no harm meant; A Zealous High-Church man I was, And so I gain'd Preferment. Unto my Flock I daily Preach'd, Kings are by God appointed, And Damn'd are those who dare resist, Or touch the Lord's Anointed.

And this is law, I will maintain unto my Dying Day, Sir.
That whatsoever King may reign, I will be the Vicar of Bray, Sir!

When Royal James possest the crown, And popery grew in fashion; The Penal Law I shouted down, And read the Declaration: The Church of Rome I found would fit Full well my Constitution, And I had been a Jesuit, But for the Revolution.

And this is law, etc.

When William our Deliverer came, To heal the Nation's Grievance, I turn'd the Cat in Pan again, And swore to him Allegiance: Old Principles I did revoke, Set conscience at a distance, Passive Obedience is a Joke, A Jest is non-resistance.

Occasional Conformists base I Damn'd, and Moderation,
And thought the Church in danger was, From such Prevarication.

USPG 2022 Lent Appeal: LIVING HOPE



All Saints will return this year to distributing envelopes for donations on Palm Sunday and collecting them back in on Easter Day. Please give as generously as you can. Speak to Jennie Loasby for more details.

Any money raised as part of USPG's 2022 Lent Appeal, Living Hope, will go towards three of our partner churches and their justice programmes. The Zambia Anglican Council's Transformative Gender Justice programme, The Church of North India's Let My People Go programme and The Church of Brazil's Casa Noeli women's refuge.

The Zambia Anglican Council set up the Transformative Gender Justice Programme to raise awareness of gender justice issues and provide support, counselling, and skills to those who have experienced gender-based violence. Loveness Malenga, a 41-year-old mother of nine, was married to a man who was physically abusive towards her and her children. Through the Zambia Anglican Council's programme she received counselling, a grant to buy seeds and access to a savings group which enabled her to live independently and give her children a safe, loving home.

In response to the increasing instances of domestic violence in Brazil the Anglican Episcopal Church set up the Casa Noeli dos Santos women's refuge. The refuge provides a safe haven for women and children experiencing domestic violence and enables them to access counselling, legal services and employment opportunities to establish independent lives.

The Church of North India works with people from the Dalit and Adivasi communities who are caught up in the cycle of debt slavery and poverty. They encourage women to join self-help groups and set up businesses to lift themselves and their families out of poverty. Lakhibala is a mother was advised by the Church of North India to join one of their self help groups. The group provided a loan and supported her to set up her own saree business. Lakhibala is now a successful businesswoman, providing a good education for her three children.
