MESSAGE FROM FR BRIAN

November is that time of the year when it is hard to escape the theme of "remembrance". Here at All Saints we keep our patronal festival on the first day of the month when we remember and give thanks for all God's saints. (This year All Saints Sunday falls on 30th October.) This is a joyful occasion and we are pleased to welcome the vice dean of Peterborough cathedral Tim Alban-Jones.

All Souls Day follows on the 2nd November (service on 31st October) when we remember our departed loved ones. A list of names is read out at the Eucharist on Monday evening.

Within a few days we are urged to remember the 5th of November. Bonfires and fireworks are a pleasant distraction as the days get darker and colder and nights are longer. But our thoughts are soon focussed on that day in the month when we are called to remember the fallen of two world wars and of other conflicts. This year the ceremony at the Cenotaph will take on a different aspect as we realise that our late beloved queen Elizabeth will not be at the laying of wreaths as she has been for most of the 70 years of her reign. King Charles will take her place.

Remembrance features largely in our acts of worship when we come to celebrate the Eucharist. As the bread and wine are offered for consecration we use the words "do this in remembrance of me." This is in obedience to our Lord's command to His disciples at the Last Supper. The simple meal of bread and wine was transformed when Jesus said "this is my body, this is my blood given for you all. The consecrated elements taken by the faithful believers enable them to share in the life of our Lord and to know the presence of God in sacrament and prayer. Fr Brian

Hall Matters - Zumba classes suspended due to illness. The Frances Lunch Club will meet for the last time on 22nd December 2022 with a Christmas party. Lyn is stepping down from her role in this.

Warm Spaces in Kettering - This project has been considered and at the present it was felt we were unable to be involved.

Health and Safety - The Risk Assessment in respect of Home Visits and Pastoral Support is ongoing.

"Of course lad, we always do. We have to, we owe it to our fallen comrades. They may forget us and the promises made leaving our heroes on the street. But we never forget.


No lad. We never forget."

THE SONG OF A SOCK

Whilst loved ones and families were apart they often sent hand knitted socks to the soldiers on the frontline during the Great war and again in World War II. Several letters have survived and in this one it says "Sent to you in England dear," (the word England was exchanged for wherever the socks were being sent to.)

This letter was sent by a mother to her future son in law in 1942, during the war along with some knitted socks. Thankfully, he came home again. This letter dated 25th Feb 1942, belongs to Pam Longe in Australia (given to us with permission to use it.)
