A MESSAGE FROM JANE BURNS

Dear Friends,

November marks the end of the Church year – we are in the season between All Saints and Advent. It is traditionally a time that we remember and reflect. We remember those who have given their lives in the pursuit of peace, we remember those who we love but see no longer on All Souls Day and we remember all the saints who challenge and encourage us to live as Jesus demands.

It is a month that reminds us that we do not live, or die, in isolation. Our actions as human beings, our decisions, have consequences for those around us, family, community and in some cases nationally and internationally. We are not unaffected by the decisions of others; we cannot afford to ignore them either. In our world of news saturation, it is easy to look in on tragedy and loss and then move on without fully engaging or reflecting on the enormity of what we are seeing.

Most recently we have watched events unfold in the Holy Land beginning with thousands of civilians being killed and many thousands more facing a lack of the necessities of life. That has spilled over into communities in this country with a spike in hate crimes against both Jewish and Muslim communities. Meanwhile the war in the Ukraine continues and there are many places around the world where people live in fear. It's easy to figuratively pass by on the other side however, all of us are connected, all of us are affected by the actions of others. Thank God that often this is in a positive way through the kindness of strangers but let us never ignore the cost of complacency.

This month especially we are called to remember that we are all in this together and as followers of Jesus Christ we all have a responsibility to seek a world where peace, justice and compassion are lived out wherever we find ourselves.

Blessed are the peacemakers: they shall be called children of God.

Love Thy Neighbour

As we move deeper into the 21st century, technology and, particularly communication, has developed so much it's not so much expanding, as exploding. You'd think better communication would bring greater knowledge and understanding and, with it, tolerance and compassion – no! There are multiple biblical references stating or confirming that all are equal yet George Orwell's perspective from his 1945 book "Animal Farm", that "all are equal but some are more equal than others", is sadly, still relevant.

The first "mobile" phone call was made in 1973. It was another 10 years before mobile phones were commercially available and even then they cost a fortune, were about the size and weight of a regular house brick, and lasted about 20 minutes if you could, indeed, even get a signal. We're now at the end of 2014 and mobile phones are everywhere and much more compact that they actually fit in a pocket. This, together with the internet, has radically changed global communication and access to knowledge. In the 1960's many homes in Britain possessed either an adult or children's version of the 'Encyclopaedia Britannica'. In reality, these 20 or so books sat on a shelf, looked impressive but were rarely used. Now they're effectively obsolete. The internet, and sites such as Wikipedia, (established in 2001) mean that the range of subjects and depth of information is so significantly greater, and available for, almost, free.

TV coverage means there's a constant perception of conflict somewhere in the world, whether that be in the Middle East, (Iraq, Afghanistan), in Southeastern Europe (former Yugoslavia), or anywhere else around the globe. Religion is often cited as a factor in these but, more correctly they're as a result of ethnic conflict and ideological differences. Power and greed, both individual and collective, also play a part. In some parts of the world (and in this context, often referred to as the Western World) perspectives and social norms have changed considerably in the last 100 years; other areas

vehemently resist such change. In the west, attitudes towards women have changed considerably with women now abundant in politics with many becoming president, prime minister or similar of their country. The position regarding people with different skin colour is changing and attitudes towards complex sexuality are the current highlight of scrutiny. The term 'woke culture' is being used to summarise this. However, Islamic fundamentalism appears resistant to many of these cultural and social changes - it's this difference (underpinned by a willingness to maintain the fundamental position at whatever cost and by whatever means) that is often the ignition of conflict.

These tensions also affect Christians. There've been various attacks on Coptic Christians in and around Egypt; this isn't new, but they do appear to be happening more regularly. There have been developments too, although both negative and positive related to the Orthodox Church. In 2007, the Russian Orthodox Church was reunified after 80 years of schism. There are similar discussions ongoing to identify a unified Ukrainian Orthodox Church, but there's political unrest in the region too. In Ukraine there'd been progress towards political association and a free trade agreement with the European Union, seen as a prelude to Ukraine becoming an EU member. However, at the last moment, the Ukrainian President Vicktor Yanukovych changed tact, refusing to sign. Revolution followed and Yanukovych was ousted from power. He'd sought closer ties with Russia and his departure was considered a 'coup d'état' by Russia who responded by invading and annexing the Crimean peninsular. This hasn't received international approval and this situation looks unsettled.

There've been developments in the Catholic church too. Long-serving Pope John Paul II died in 2005 and was succeeded by his close friend Joseph Ratzinger, who assumed the papal name of Benedict XVI. There were concerns about Benedict's past: raised in Bavaria, Germany he was conscripted into the Hitler Youth movement in 1941 at age 14 and later into the German infantry. However, it became clear that these were enforced associations and he'd returned to his seminary training almost immediately after the war. Seen as a traditionalist, within 2 years he'd relaxed the Roman Missal instructions allowing the Traditional Latin Mass (which had largely been replaced) to be celebrated more easily. By

maintaining a strict stance on the non-use of condoms, he came under criticism from the Public Health field amid concerns about the spread of HIV and other sexual diseases in many areas, especially Africa.

There've been increased rumours of sexual abuse and inappropriate behaviour within the Catholic Church over decades, yet Benedict seemed not to want to address this difficult topic, again receiving criticism. As a result of more liberal changes within the Church of England, the Catholic Church has established 3 "Anglican Ordinates" around the world. These Ordinates, which have equivalent status to a diocese, provide a route to Catholicism for members of other denominations (not just C of E). In the UK, this is titled as "The Personal Ordinate of Our Lady of Walsingham". In 2013, in failing health, Benedict decided to abdicate his papal role - the first Pope to take such action in nearly 600 years. He's now known as 'Pope Emeritus'. So now we've the first Pope to come from the America's, and, in fact, the first non-European in modern times. Jorge Bergoglio is Argentinian, so the first Pope to hail from the southern hemisphere. He's also the first Jesuit to be Pope and, in a further first, he's taken the name of Francis, in honour of St Francis of Assisi.

Elsewhere, and particularly in Britain, things are changing, although at different rates depending on the topic and your perspective. In 2005, the Church of England appointed its first black Archbishop, John Sentamu. Born in Uganda before later moving to the UK, he's become Archbishop of York. In 2006, the Church of England General Synod made a public apology for the institutional role it played as a historic owner of slave plantations in the West Indies. Recognition of one's wrongdoing is the first step in moving forward and together with Sentamu's appointment shows the Church of England is willing to get away from racial barriers.

Last time, we reported on the ordination of the first female priests in the Church of England. This area of equality has moved on rapidly. By 2010 there were more women being ordained each year than men. In 2005, Synod voted to allow female bishops. It's taken until just recently for the necessary change in Canon Law, but it's just been announced that Libby Lane will shortly become the first female bishop - Bishop of Stockport.

Like the Catholic Church, the Church of England is facing rumours of historical sexual issues, so this topic looks set to be a major challenge in the near future. Many of these rumours involve male priests with young boys, therefore, not only being an issue of abuse, it's also an aspect of homosexuality and same sex relationships. As a country, Britain introduced a form of civil union known as a 'Civil Partnership' in 2004; more recently, in 2013, same sex marriage has been legalised. This is an area that remains beyond any consideration by the Catholic Church. The Church of England, however, is seeking to address this matter, albeit tentatively. There's a wide spread of opinions within the Church of England, but the church has allowed gay and lesbian priests in civil partnerships since 2005 and from 2013 this has also applied to bishops. At the moment, there's no consensus within the church, so it may be sometime before the Church of England has a clear definitive position.

Despite the well-known parable of the 'Good Samaritan' from the Gospel according to St Luke, the worldwide church is clearly at different points in the journey to answer the question of "who is my neighbour?" There may, therefore, be some way to go before the action of 'loving thy neighbour', irrespective of any "baggage" can be achieved.
