Bishop Debbie Sellin is Confirmed as the 39th Bishop of Peterborough



The service, which is steeped in history and tradition, takes place in the presence of the Archbishop of Canterbury in the Court of the Vicar General. It confirms that the correct procedures have been carried out to allow Bishop Debbie to legally become the Bishop of Peterborough, following her Appointment by the Crown Nominations Commission and her Election by the Canons of Peterborough Cathedral.

The current wording in the process of confirmation, which would have been in Latin prior to the eighteenth century, reflects its origins in medieval canon law. There are several stages in the proceedings which include: the reading of the Letters Patent, which is a decree from the King to the Archbishop to arrange the confirmation; the legal representative of the new Bishop, and the legal representative of the Diocese proving that all the necessary procedures have been adhered to and there are no objections; Bishop Debbie taking her oaths of allegiance; and the decree of the Court which confers upon her 'the care, government and administration of the spirituals' of the bishopric.

Whilst this means that Bishop Debbie is now legally the Bishop of Peterborough, her duties will be delegated to Bishop John until her

installation at Peterborough Cathedral in March when her public ministry will begin.

During the service Archbishop Justin gave a charge to Bishop Debbie, calling on her to remember 'above all the one who has commissioned you' saying 'the most important thing is not who you are but whose you are', and asking her to challenge as well as being challenged, to uphold the unity of the Church, to explore opportunities for effective ministry and mission and to encourage clergy and laity alike in their discernment and strengths.

The Archbishop also asked her to prepare herself with deep prayer and contemplation and be present in the community both at times of joy and sorrow.

The service was attended by Bishop Debbie's friends, family and colleagues from the Diocese of Peterborough.

Just before Christmas, David Garrett contacted me to tell me the story of Harold Henry Collier born 10.12.1910. His parents were Henry Collier and Isabel Ellen Freeman that married on 25th December 1900 at the Parish Church of Kettering. By 1911 they were living at 5 Morely Street, Kettering. Harold was baptised at All Saints church on 5.2.1911 by Rev F.C. Woodhouse.

Harold Henry Collier later married Alice Moisey in 1937.

By the 1939 census, the Collier family (Henry, Isabel, Harold, Alice, were living at 12 St Andrew Street, Kettering. They lived next door to Bertie and Joan Garrett (David's parents.)

David's father, Bertie Garrett was in the army, and he never saw his dad until he was 6 years old.



Harold Collier took David under his wing, and they went everywhere together; camping, fishing, and walking and educating him on the wonders of the countryside. When Harold became ill in his later years, David looked after him until he died. After his death his wife found a photo of David in his wallet that Harold had carried around all his life.

Harold Collier and his wife Alice never had any children of their own.

David Garrett said "I owe a lot to this man. I'm sure Harold would be honoured to be in this church magazine!"

IT WAS JUST A CARD ...

When I visited my nephew, then a vicar in Suffolk, a year ago I was prevailed upon to stay an extra day as the clergy from the deanery were going by coach to visit Mother Julian's chapel in Norwich and there was a spare place for me.

In the bookshop there, I bought an attractive postcard with the well-known words of Mother Julian 'All shall be well, and all shall be well; all manner of things shall be well'. I put the card in my prayer book and there it stayed until several months later I received a phone call from one of my Northumbria Community friends asking me to pray for her. Her life, she said, was falling apart, she had lost her job and temporarily at least, her faith. She felt, she said, completely at sea. I remembered the card and sent it to her with a message of support on the back, and she put it in her Bible.

Several weeks later she phoned me again. This time to say she was about to start a new job, her life had got back together again and prayers had been answered. Then she told me about the card. She had woken up one morning and suddenly felt prompted to take it out and put it in her window of her front room which faces on to the street - the card could be clearly read from outside. A week later there came a knock on her door and a strange young man was standing there, said he'd read the words on the card and could he come in and talk to her. Rather hesitantly, she invited him in and offered him a cup of tea. He told her he'd won a scholarship to Oxford University but found the pressure too much and had suffered a severe nervous break-down. My friend, having had a similar experience, was able to help him and he went away more hopefully than he had set out.

At a 'Churches Together' meeting a week or two later she met the boy's mother, who told her that her son had not spoken one word to her or anyone since coming home from Oxford until that day he'd read the card and come into my friend's house for help. He was now fully recovered and had recommenced his studies, this time successfully. A series of coincidences - or was it the intervention of the Holy Spirit?
