Neighbourhood Watch brings neighbours together to tackle crime and promote a sense of cooperation in their local community.

Each watch is led by a coordinator whose role it is to arrange meetings and act as a point of contact for the council and police.

Neighbourhood Watch Association

Westminster has introduced an Association to lead the way in how Neighbourhood Watch is run On 13th November, Westminster held its first Neighbourhood Watch Association meeting. The Association will allow Neighbourhood Watch Coordinators to work with the council and the police to support and improve Neighbourhood Watch across Westminster.

Suggested topics for future discussion by the group include Neighbourhood Watch street signage and improving communication channels between watches and the local police.

The next meeting will be held in January.



Professional Witness Scheme

Westminster has launched a professional witness service to help tackle crime.

Also known as an expert witness, a professional witness is a specialist in a subject (through training or special knowledge) and may present his or her expert opinion in court without having been actual witness to any occurrence relating to a lawsuit or criminal case.

The service aims to use technology and a keener focus on evidence gathering to more quickly resolve serious and high risk cases of anti-social behaviour (ASB), increase conviction rates and reduce repeated reports of ASB. It also aims to give more support to high risk victims and reduce the number of cases that are discontinued because victims are reluctant to support a prosecution.

Two professional witness officers will take case referrals directly from CityWest Homes. Their duties include supporting victims, securing witness statements, collecting video surveillance evidence that can be used in court, identify perpetrators and attending court to present evidence.



Crime prevention news

The updates below are from the council's Community Protection team who are responsible for coordinating responses to crime, anti-social behaviour and environmental problems on a neighbourhood basis.

. Burglary, north Westminster

The police and council have been helping residents and businesses keep their premises secure from burglary and have also arrested some prolific burglars who are now in prison. Residential burglary has now dropped significantly in several areas of Westminster.

Please remember that scaffolding can be an easy route in for a committed burglar. If you have scaffolding where you live, make sure your doors and windows are secure.

Cashpoint theft, Elgin Avenue

The Harrow Road Community Protection Officer has been working with local police and RBS bank to address the issue of a wall which was shielding the cashpoint and making people vulnerable to thieves. The wall has now been removed which has led to a more open and safer environment for anyone wishing to use the bank or any other local shops. The team expect cashpoint theft to be significantly reduced in the area, if not eliminated, following this simple change.

Martlett Court, Covent Garden

The local Warden and Community
Protection Officer found out recently that
many people were parking illegally in
Martlett Court which was causing an
obstruction and providing hiding points
for people engaged in anti-social
behaviour. They arranged for a new
locking system to be fitted to the access
gate and restricted how many people were
given a copy. The area now looks much
better, safer, and anti-social behaviour has
considerably reduced.

Rough sleeping, Victoria

The council, police, homeless services and the Victoria Business Improvement District have been working together to support rough sleepers in the Victoria area by helping them into permanent accommodation and enforcing against anti-social behaviour. The team have also secured vulnerable areas and cleaned up areas affected.

Begging, central Westminster

In addition to supporting rough sleepers, the council is committed to targeting those who come to the city to make money through begging and causing disruption. Four Anti-Social Behaviour Orders (ASBOs) have been issued against the most prolific offenders who are now banned from Westminster completely. If the orders are breached, it could result in a prison sentence.
